## Curriculum/Instruction Professional Development

## **Director of Professional Development & Curriculum Instruction**

Our curriculum Department Initiative this year was to provide content area specialists to serve our districts as they implement Ohio's New Learning Standards in Math, English Language Arts, Science and Social Studies. Marcia Barnhart, George Viebranz, Michael Edelman, Fred Dillon, and Dr. Katie Knapp provided regional trainings as well as onsite contracted services. The challenge for teachers and administrators this Fall was focused around student growth measures and writing student learning objectives creating a demand for regional support sessions and onsite trainings.

In order to ensure a fair and equitable review for those teachers submitting SLO's, we have offered regional overview as well as in depth onsite Calibration Sessions for the Review Committees. Teachers needed to be well versed in assessment literacy in order to submit a reliable, valid, and bias free pre and post assessment with their SLO's. This resulted in a regional session on assessment literacy hosted at our office and further supported by an ODE Assessment Literacy Consultant, hired through Raise to the Top Funds.

We continued to foster the use of formative instructional practices in Science and Math through Professional Learning Networks to assist teachers in the daily usage. With the release of PARCC and next generation assessment blueprints, we have devoted sessions for Social Studies, English Language Arts, Math and Science teachers as well as those who serve the Gifted population in order to prepare for the rigor and technology skill demands. Curriculum Directors across Northern Ohio were provided opportunities to meet monthly as well as our Lorain County Directors in more in depth support sessions with our Specialists.


To promote alignment to the Ohio's New Learning Standards, all of our content area trainings including two large conferences for Math and ELA included the dissemination of the Quality Review Rubric. This tool was designed to support teachers and/or teams to review their lessons and units to ensure that they are aligned to the shifts in the content standards, along with the depth of knowledge (ie rigor) that is expected. It is critical that this tool is understood by administration and utilized by all teachers across our county.

This year we took a small step toward blended professional development through the use of a learning management system, Eduplanet21. The Curriculum Department has created a learning pathway on Academic Vocabulary that is an interactive book study. The Science and Math Consultant utilized this platform to provide teachers in grades 3-5 and 6-8 with a vehicle to network around formative instructional practices. At both our REACHigher ELA and Math Conferences we asked our participants to review modules on the Habits of Mind and Webb's Depth of Knowledge prior to the event and then offered a Skype session with experts during the conference. Following the conference, participants were enticed to continue networking as they completed the modules online.

## Special Projects

**Title I Delinquent Education Program –** This is regular school for incarcerated and sheltered youth at all the Lorain County Juvenile Court Residential Facilities (Detention Home, Stepping Stone Boys Group Home, Pathways Girls Group Home, and Turning Point Shelter). All residents at all facilities receive a 6-hour school-day of direct-instruction by HQT education professionals. The curriculum consists of Language Arts, Mathematics, Social Studies, Science, Technology & Art.

**Detention Home** residency averages 38 boys (max is 45) & 9 girls (max is 12) and stays can be anywhere from 1 to 30 days or longer. The average stay is 2 weeks. Residents are all felons. We have 4 teachers at DH (Lang Arts, Math & Science, Social Studies & Tech, Individualized Instruction for special-needs or special-curriculum situations).

**Stepping Stone & Pathways** average population is 16 boys (max is 20) & 7 girls (max is 10); stays are 5 months which allows for intensive rehab. Residents are minor felons. We have 3 teachers at SS/PW (LangArts & Sci, SocStudies & LangArts, Math & LangArts).

**Turning Point Shelter** average residencies are 4 boys (max is 5) & 3 girls (max is 5); stays can be anywhere from 1 to 30 days or longer. The average stay is 8 days. Residents are in protective custody. We have 1 teacher at TP (who operates a one-room school-house using home-schooling-techniques & activities integrating all subjects).

**Title I Homeless Education Program** – This program covers all of Region 2 SST (Lorain, Erie & Huron Counties) and is supported by our McKinney-Vento Grant; it consists of two parts:

- 1. Professional development, awareness & consultation services:
- 2. Tutoring & academic services:

**Pupil Transportation Appreciation & Prof. Development** is an awards banquet for the Bus Drivers of Lorain County. We have a dinner and a speaker so they can get professional development hours certificates. We give out awards to one particular bus driver of a district that is chosen by the Transportation Supervisor of that district. This is held in October each year.

**School Safety Seminar** is a training program that "trains the trainer" of other schools on ODE & HB Laws and Requirements. We offer this training to everyone who deals with students – i.e. Superintendents, Principals, Guidance Counselors, Teachers, etc. This is a required training every 5 years for every education professional by ODE. This event is held in January each year.

Agency Cross-Training Seminars gathers a variety of agencies in Lorain County who deal with children/youth. Examples of who presents at the seminar is personnel from Nord Center, Children Services, Ohio Guidestone, Bellefaire JCB, Applewood, Lorain County Juvenile Courts, Lorain County Board of Developmental Disabilities, LC Alcohol & Drug Abuse Services, etc. Each presenter has 30 minutes to talk about their agency and what they do. We have a wide variety of participants attend, from teachers to guards at the detention home. It is received well by the community and we are usually at full capacity within 3 days of releasing the registration information.

**Nordson Grant** is monies the ESC receives from the Nordson Corporation each year. We send out applications to all schools in Lorain County including Private Schools and a committee decides which school/teacher receives the grant they asked for. The process begins in August and is complete in June the following year.

## **SUPPORT to Speech-Language Pathologists**

SIXTY SLPs from 25 districts receive a monthly e-packet of information and are provided access to a pass coded section of the ESC's website specific to the practice of speech-language pathology in the school setting. The web pages and e-packets are provided by Barb Conrad, Regional Supervisor of Speech/Language Therapy Services. In addition, professional development, quarterly meetings, clinics and labs were offered to district speech-language pathologists by Barb Conrad throughout the 2013-14 school year. ## **SUPPORT TO NEW HIRES**

New speech-language pathologists must be rigorously supervised as they undergo their clinical fellowship (CF) year. Successful completion of their CF year results in obtaining Ohio Board licensure (a requirement to work in schools) and a Certificate of Clinical Competence from ASHA.

Barb provided CF supervision and mentorship to FOUR new SLPs during the 2013-14 school year totaling 69 observations. Three of the SLPs were recommended for their licensure. Since Ruth is a part-time employee, her CF year is continued for one more school year.

#### RECRUITMENT/RETENTION

Partnerships Barb has developed with the University of Akron, Cleveland State University, Kent State University, University of Cincinnati, Bowling Green University, Ohio University, Miami University and The Ohio State University continued as SIX student SLPs were placed in the following districts during the school year:

SLPs in the region mentor area students pursuing a career in speech-language pathology. Currently, there are **fifteen** students from area high schools in pursuit of a bachelor's or master's degree from an Ohio university Barb keeps in contact with the students encouraging them to consider student teaching in the region and to seek a position in the school setting in the three county region.

Filling temporary vacancies for medical leaves, etc is always a challenge. This year Barb assisted in filling **four** short term positions mostly working with area retirees or small agencies to fill the positions in the following districts: Vermilion, Bellevue, Avon and Avon Lake.

In the fall, Barb held her annual Retiree Luncheon to keep in touch with area retirees to assist with short term openings throughout the year. **Eleven** retirees attended the event. All are welcome at many of the professional development offerings Barb provides in order to keep their licensure current.

## **Regional Educational Audiologist**

During the 2013-14 school year, the Educational Audiologist provided direct audiological services to meet the needs of students in 20 participating school districts in Lorain, Erie and Huron Counties. The difference between a clinical audiologist and an educational audiologist is that the educational audiologist understands school-based issues and practices and can assist the school team in understanding the link between hearing, language and learning for their students.

During the 2013-14 school year, the educational audiologist provided the following services:

- Initial evaluation and re-evaluation of individual students' hearing ability status for determination of eligibility or continuation of specially designed services.
- Appropriately fitting (only an educational audiologist can determine the need for and fit FM systems) FM systems for students with hearing impairment so they have direct access to the teacher's voice in the educational environment. Followup services dealing with troubleshooting equipment problems during the school year when necessary.
- Group and individual instruction (training) to general educators, special educators and related service personnel on the care, maintenance and daily listening checks of hearing aids, cochlear implants and FM systems per specific students.
- Active contributing member to ETR, IEP and 504 school teams such as needed evaluations, formulate appropriate individual education goals and determine appropriate assistive hearing technology.
- Conducting a Functional Listening Evaluation (FLE) for students with hearing impairments to
  provide objective information about how their listening abilities are affected by noise, distance and
  visual input in a student's natural listening environment. These evaluation results justifying
  accommodations that needs to be made.
- Direct consultation about specific student needs (accommodations and modifications) to school district personnel through the school year.
- Evaluating the classroom acoustical environment to maximize all children's auditory learning potential which entails the measuring of the sound level of the classroom and the reverberation (echo) within the classroom so appropriate modifications and adaptations can be put in place.
- Group and individual instruction to general educators on how to appropriately utilize an audio distribution system (ADS also referred to as soundfield system) in their classroom.
- Coordinating and facilitating the pure-tone audiometer service contract program so participating school districts receive a substantial discount per the cost of their units.

#### **North Coast Shared Services Alliance**

Our collaboration is the first of its kind in our state; as four wide-ranging ESCs partner with the most respected, private sector substitute provider, to deliver the best of all worlds for districts in Northeast Ohio. This service is brought to you through the **North Coast Shared Services Alliance**: where you find **Shared Services – In Action.** 

The priorities of **NCSSA** are to reduce costs and increase efficiencies to partners and school districts who participate in the program. With equal importance, it's also our priority to streamline the application, hiring, training and scheduling process for substitutes.

The 2013-2014 school year is the first for the ESC to work with NCSSA. The Lorain County districts participating are:

Clearview, Early Learning Center, Firelands, Lorain City, Vermilion and Wellington

The goal for each student participant is competitive employment. The program provides real-life work experience combined with training in employability and independent living skills to help youths with significant disabilities make successful transitions from school to productive adult life. The Project SEARCH model involves an extensive period of training and career exploration, innovative adaptations, long-term job coaching, and continuous feedback from teachers, job coaches, and employers. As a result, at the completion of the training program, students with significant intellectual disabilities are employed in nontraditional, complex and rewarding jobs. The presence of a Project SEARCH High School Transition Program can bring about long-term changes in business culture that have far-reaching positive effects on attitudes about hiring people with disabilities and the range of jobs in which they can be successful.

#### **Eligibility**

Project SEARCH serves students with significant intellectual and developmental disabilities. Typically, these are students who are on an Individual Education Program (IEP) and in their last year of high school eligibility. The most important criterion for acceptance into Project SEARCH is a desire to achieve competitive employment.

## **Program Overview**

Students attend the program for a full school year in the host business/hospital. The business provides access to an on-site classroom that can accommodate up to 12 students. The site is staffed by a special education teacher and one to three job coaches to meet the educational and training needs of the students.

The ESC has two host sites: Lorain County Community College and Mercy Hospital, Lorain

- Six students at Lorain County Community College
- Eight students at Mercy Hospital

Project SEARCH is funded through the UCP United Cerebral Palsy, but is supported through the collaboration of United Rehabilitation Services, Developmental Disabilities of Lorain County, Opportunities for Ohioans with Disabilities, State Support Team Region 2, the students' families and the city and county school districts.

## **Early Learning Center Supervisor**



- Program is five days per week with three hours per session (A.M. and P.M.) classes.
- 86 children are from our Special Education Consortium Districts which include children from Clearview Local Schools, Columbia Local Schools, Firelands Local Schools, Keystone Local Schools, Midview Local Schools and Wellington Exempted Village Schools.
- 66 children typically developing children provide role models. Children who are typically developing are from sounding school districts which may include those listed above as well as other districts.
- Five classes are integrated classes two of which are part of our Early Childhood Education Grant.
- · One class is self-contained.
- 24 children receive Itinerant Special Education Services.
- The Assessment Team has completed 97 Special Education Initial Assessments.
- The Assessment Team has completed 54 Special Education Re-Evaluations for children moving to kindergarten.
- Parent Teacher Conferences are held twice a year, once in the fall and once in the spring.
- Parents receive quarterly report cards for their child.
- Staff includes: 9 classroom teachers, 1 itinerant teacher, 10 classroom aides, 2 psychologists, 3 speech language pathologist, 1 occupation therapist, 1 secretary, 1 Supervisor.
- Staff Professional Development include: Crisis Intervention Training, Child Abuse, CLASS Overview, SLO Training, Blood Borne Pathogen Training; Curriculum Alignment; Overview of Preschool Standards.
- Family Involvement includes: Meet and Greet in August, Parent Teacher Conferences, Psychologist Evening
  Program on Autism, Parent Volunteers in Classroom, PTO, Family Apple Orchard Field Trip, Halloween Parade,
  Christmas / Holiday Program, End of the Year Classroom Programs and Ice Cream Social, Family Field Trip to the
  Cleveland Zoo.
- Gross motor play space includes a gym as well as an outdoor playground.
- Two Grants: Special Education IDEA Early Childhood and Early Childhood Education Grant
- Two fund raisers for additional equipment through Mama Jo Pie Sale at Thanksgiving and Malley's Candy Sale at Easter Time.
- JVS Early Childhood students partner with our center for observations in our classrooms as part of their (unpaid)
   Work Based Learning Experiences.
- The Grafton Public Library has partnered with our school to provide story time for our children.

## **Program Director**

The Lorain County Academy harbors 40 at-risk students from 11 school districts in Lorain County who have not been academically successful in the traditional school classroom. These students come from middle and high schools throughout Lorain County. Their placement at our alternative academy is due to low academic performance, absenteeism, along with behavioral, social and emotional issues.

#### GOALS:

- 1. Provide alternative learning experiences in a non-traditional classroom setting resulting in higher student engagement and academic achievement.
- 2. Provide student the opportunity to experience positive learning experiences and success. Nurture high selfesteem and an understanding of appropriate behavior and actions in a variety of social situations.
- 3. Provide students with unlimited moments throughout the school day to assist with social/emotional issues and time to reflect on their behavior. Discuss strategies they can implement and practice to control inappropriate social behavior which will allow them to eventually return to their home school environment with a better skill set to be academically and behaviorally successful.
- 4. Increase student attendance.
